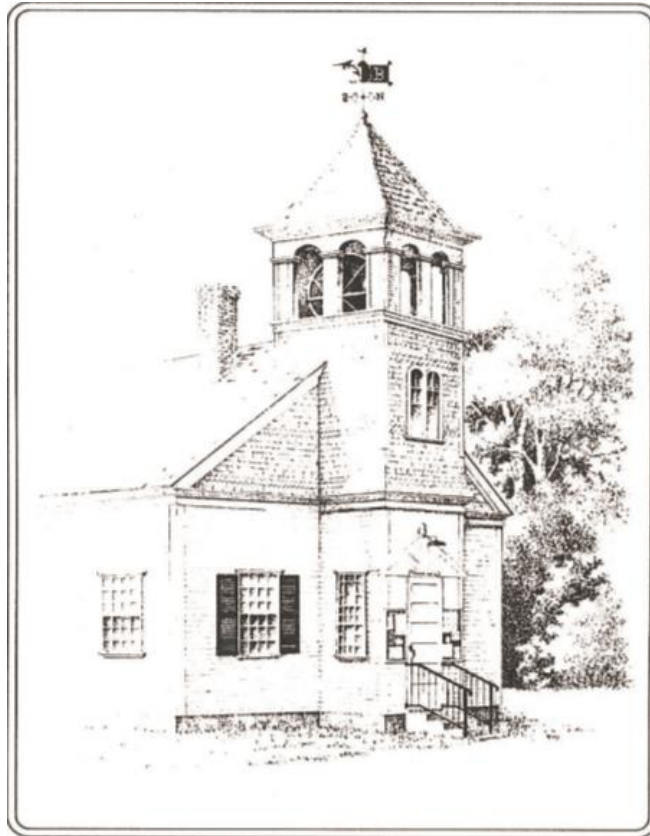

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EMERGENCY SERVICES

In an Emergency or Crisis Situation Dial: 911

Call 911 if you can. Text 911 if you can't.

Text-to-911 allows residents in dangerous situations who are unable to risk the noise of a call to send a text for help. This will help save lives and must be used responsibly. Texting should only be used when a voice call is not possible, as voice calls provide an advantage by allowing the 911 call taker to assess the type of emergency and the location of the emergency more quickly.

- Enter the numbers '911' in the message 'To' field
- In the message field, type your exact location and a brief description of the help you need – use simple words, do not use abbreviations or shorthand
- Push the 'Send' button and
- Be prepared to answer the 911 telecommunicators questions

Brookfield Emergency Management and Emergency Shelter

In the event of a widespread Brookfield town power outage, freezing cold weather, or other town-wide emergency, one of the selectmen will open the Brookfield Town House for impacted citizens. It operates on a generator, so it will have power, heat, and hot water. The kitchen can be used to prepare meals and there is an ADA accessible bathroom. If the emergency is longer lasting, citizens may also shelter overnight; cots are available. In the event of a non-widespread emergency, citizens can call one of the selectmen, who will open the Brookfield Town House for use.

Safe Sitter®

This course is a babysitting training program for boys and girls in grades 6-8. Safe Sitter prepares students in grades 6-8 to be safe when they're home alone, watching younger siblings, or babysitting. Students learn lifesaving skills such as how to rescue someone who is choking, and helpful information like what to do if there's severe weather. The lessons are filled with fun activities and roll-playing exercises. Students even get to use CPR manikins to practice choking rescue and CPR. Course length is 5.5 hours. Locations vary.

Moose Mountain Regional Greenways

Moose Mountains Regional Greenways (MMRG) was founded in 1999 by Conservation Commissioners and Planning Board members from the towns of Brookfield, Farmington, Middleton, Milton, New Durham, and Wakefield. The newly formed group named itself after the Moose Mountains range central to the region. Today, MMRG serves nine member communities: Brookfield, Farmington, Middleton, Milton, New Durham, Ossipee, Tuftonboro, Wakefield, and Wolfeboro.

As a facilitator of land conservation projects, MMRG has helped protect approximately 4,800 acres including the Moose Mountains Reservation, now owned by the Forest Society. In 2013, the Board adopted a 5-year strategic plan to expand our impact by undertaking the everlasting responsibility of holding conservation easements and owning and stewarding our own conservation land.

Our mission is to conserve key natural resource areas in our New Hampshire communities and connect them within a permanently protected network of greenways and open space for today and tomorrow.

*To become a licensed hunter in New Hampshire, you must complete a Hunter Education course. **Hunter Education is required for new hunters to purchase their first hunting or archery license.** Classes are open to New Hampshire residents and non-residents age 12 and older. Hunter Education covers safe firearms handling, archery equipment, wildlife management principles, map and compass skills, New Hampshire game laws, and more. NH Fish and Game offers two types of Hunter Education courses: traditional Hunter Education in a classroom or an online Hunter Education with Field Day.*

We are open to the public and offer 7 trails from green to black diamond, glade skiing, night skiing, a terrain park, one of the fastest rope tows on the East Coast, friendly staff and a small lodge with wood stove and space to relax. We have a full-size groomer and a small snowmaking operation. Due to the relatively small crowds (compared to the big boys like Loon, Gunstock, and Bretton Woods), there are no lift lines, great conditions with virtually no ice and a friendly, small-town vibe.

Brewster Heath Preserve

Brewster Heath Preserve is located behind the Kingswood Regional School District's Wolfeboro campus, providing access to outdoor exploration for students in Wolfeboro, grades 4-12, and nature lovers. In 2020, 1.5 miles walking trails were built by Wentworth Watershed Association (WWA) volunteers. These trails wander through upland, wetland, and shoreline terrain. In 2021 an outdoor classroom was constructed as an Eagle Scout Project in partnership with local Boy Scouts of America – Pack 165. 18 interpretive signs are installed along the trail that cover watershed and environmental topics, as well as historical land use in Wolfeboro by Native Americans and colonial settlers in Wolfeboro.

Cotton Valley Rail Trail (The Rail Trail)

The Rail Trail, the former route of the Wolfeboro Railroad, is one of the area's best kept secrets. Born at the end of the Civil War, it starts behind the old train depot in Wolfeboro and travels along the Back Bay to Wolfeboro Falls. The 12-mile corridor connects with the Cotton Valley trail and continues past Albee Beach, to Fernald Station, through Brookfield and east to Sanbornville. The trail travels alongside three lakes and winds through the woods and fields of the Cotton Valley. This hard-packed trail offers recreational opportunities to people of all ages and interests – walking, biking, running, wildlife viewing, fishing, and railway motor cars. And in winter cross-country skiing and snowmobiling.

The Wakefield Police Department also utilizes the Town of Wakefield contract with the Lakes Region Humane Society for the care and housing of stray, unwanted, abused, and neglected small animals such as dogs and cats. Animals taken into the Wakefield Police Department kennel that are unclaimed after 72 hours are taken to the Humane Society for further housing, attempt to find their home, and adoption if necessary. The Wakefield Police Department has 24/7 access to the Lakes Region Humane Society facility to drop off such animals. This service applies to animals located in Wakefield or animals registered in Wakefield, it does not include Brookfield animals. The Lakes Region Humane Society staff handles further care of the animals, attempts to find their home, collecting kennel/dog at large fees and adoption if necessary. The Wakefield Police Department charges a \$15.00 kennel fee for all animals brought to the kennel by an Officer or brought by a 3rd party. For each additional day your pet is stored at our kennel, an additional \$10.00 kennel fee is incurred. Payments must be paid in full prior to a pet being released from the facility.

- There is no cost to residents to dispose of household trash or to recycle aluminum and tin cans, plastics, glass, and corrugated cardboard, as well as some other metals. Yard waste and small limbs and brush may also be discarded at the facility
- For latex/water-based paints: Add absorbents (cat litter) then let dry paint and dispose with your regular household garbage

Household Hazardous Waste Day

Wakefield and Brookfield residents are invited to participate in a special Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day at the Wakefield Transfer Station. This collection will allow Wakefield and Brookfield residents the opportunity to remove hazardous substances from their homes while ensuring safe and clean disposal at proper waste collection facilities. In doing so, we help keep hazardous substances out of local landfills and homes, resulting in a safer community and a cleaner environment.

Participants must have a valid Transfer Station Sticker to participate. All materials must be in **original containers with labels**. Household only. NO COMMERCIAL HAZARDOUS WASTE.

The Alliance for Community Transportation

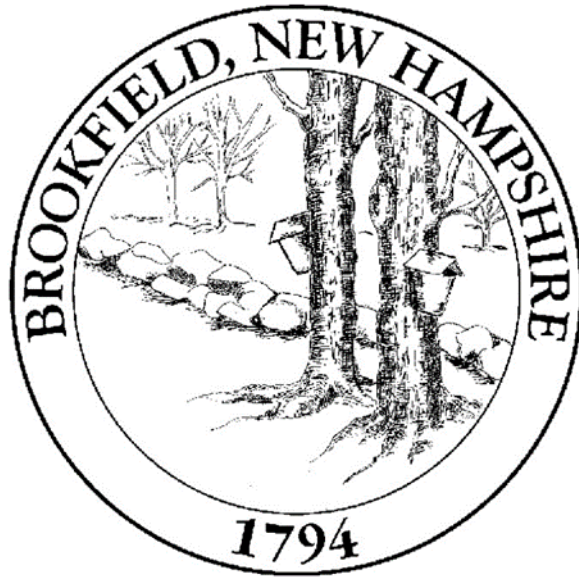
